Synopsis

Just one month on and times they are a-changing. Shirley (Ella Scott Lynch) is confronted with the return of her first child, and Matron (Mandy McElhinney) is determined to see the re-opening of Stanton House. Joan (Jessica Marais) struggles to have it all – husband, baby and career - and Annie (Gracie Gilbert) struggles to make ends meet. Patty's (Harriet Dyer) business is booming, whilst Viv (Sophie Hensser) is in desperate search of a connection ... and Martha (Miranda Tapsell) is faced with a question that is hard to answer.

Times they are a-changing.

It's 1970 and times they are a-changing. The Vietnam War is dividing the world, music and the media are shifting old ideals, and the lines between friendship, love and marriage are blurring.

It's a month after we left the young women of Kings Cross Hospital and Stanton House, and all of them are now in the throes of dealing with the choices and ramifications of the events of series two.

Dr Joan Millar (Jessica Marais) continues her career as one of the country's most promising obstetricians in this brave new world of laparoscopic surgery and burgeoning fertility treatments. But juggling a baby, a husband who is facing manslaughter charges, as well as the inconveniences of living on-site at the hospital, takes its toll. A sudden infection and emergency surgery leaves Joan facing a life of infertility, and it's not long before she must face the truth of McNaughton's (Jonathan LaPaglia) part in Greg Mathieson's death – a death that has led to a manslaughter charge and the possibility of Jim (Matthew Le Nevez) facing 12 years behind bars. The return of McNaughton's estranged wife Eva (Maya Stange) poses a challenge Joan can't refuse, but their unexpected alliance will have far-reaching implications that no one saw coming.



The closure of Stanton House has put Matron (Mandy McElhinney) on the warpath. She shoehorns her way onto the Hospital Board and does everything in her power to have the home for unwed mothers reopened – forging an uneasy alliance with Joan in the process. Her growing relationship, as both mother and employer, with son Chris (Lincoln Younes) is forever on tenterhooks as Chris' relationship with Annie (Gracie Gilbert) and baby Deanna becomes more serious. Annie may be carrying Matron's grandchild, but blood ties do not make the situation in any way comfortable for either of them – Annie has every reason to fear Matron's motives...

Having secretly located her twin babies, Viv throws caution to the wind and befriends their adoptive mother Faye (Jessica Donoghue). Her illegal contact infuriates Matron, but the situation doesn't last long as Faye and the twins move overseas permanently.

The Vietnam War and the growing anti-war movement have a direct impact on the lives of our characters. Shirley (Ella Scott Lynch) arranges an opportunity of a lifetime for Annie to sing for the troops, and Viv - desperate to locate her brother Bernie (a soldier missing in action) - volunteers to go with her as a field nurse. Their initial excitement soon turns to shock and sadness. Instead of finding Bernie, Viv finds his Vietnamese wife (and baby son) - only for a harrowing set of events to leave her all alone again.

The realities of war – death, disease and countless children orphaned – spur Annie to use her newfound fame to help the antiwar movement when she gets back home. It's a stance that Chris struggles with – the cops are on to his prior shady deals and are willing to use them to turn Chris into a secret police informant.

After finding love in season two, Martha's (Miranda Tapsell) relationship gets serious when Bowditch (Andrew Ryan) asks for her hand in marriage. His proposal throws Martha's past as well as her future into sharp focus.

Will becoming a doctor's wife spell the end of independence for her, and after finally locating her Mother; will the ghosts of her past ever find peace?



In the heart of the bustling Cross, Patty (Harriet Dyer) has inadvertently become the success she once dreamed. Her crèche is full of babies and toddlers but Patty still clings to her desire to one day fall in love and have a family of her own. It leads her into hot water when she falls for the wrong man and commits a startling betrayal. Consumed by guilt and left with a broken heart, has Patty ruined a dear friendship forever?

The Blue Moon Club has a new owner, Leon (Jeremy Lindsay Taylor), and he's making life tough for Shirley. Having to keep her age and her motherhood a secret, she also has to jump through hoops to prove her worth to the new boss.

Shirley's world is turned on it's head though with the arrival of Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland), a delinquent teen who shows up drunk and pregnant on the steps of Stanton House demanding to know the identity of her birth mother.

It's not long before Shirley puts the pieces of the puzzle together and she must come face-to-face with the vexing choice she was forced to make fifteen years ago when she gave up her first child...

Jessica Marais was most recently seen in her TV Week Logie Award nominated role as *Dr Joan Miller* in the second season of The NINE Network's popular drama **Love Child**.

She also starred in the ABC telemovie **Carlotta**, for which she received two Silver TV Week Logie nominations, and the US series **Magic City**, opposite Jeffrey Dean Morgan and Olga Kurylenko, for the Starz Network.

Previously, Jessica completed production on Jim Loach's **Untitled** feature film. She made her feature debut in **Two Fists One Heart** directed by Shawn Seet and has also appeared in the Australian film **Needle** and was the voice of 'Rochelle' in Disney's animated feature, **Planes**.

Jessica came to prominence with her role in the Seven Network's **Packed to the Rafters**. Her performance earned her two TV Week Logie Awards in 2009 for Most Outstanding New Talent and Most Popular New Female Talent as well as a further four nominations for Most Outstanding Actress and Most Popular Actress. In 2011, Jessica was also nominated for the Gold TV Week Logie Award for Most Popular Personality on Australian Television. Her other television credits include the Disney series, Legend of the Seeker.

In early 2008, she debuted with the Sydney Theatre Company in the critically acclaimed production of A Season at Sarsaparilla and in early 2014, she appeared on stage in David Berthold's Cosi for La Boite.

Jessica is a graduate of the National Institute of Dramatic Art (NIDA), Australia's most prestigious acting school.

Internationally acclaimed, Jonathan LaPaglia is one of Australia's leading actors. He recently received a 2015 Monte Carlo Television Festival Golden Nymph nomination for Best Actor in a Drama Series for his role as Dr Patrick McNaughton.

Receiving critical acclaim for his stand out performance as Anthony 'Rooster' Perish in the high rating Nine drama **Underbelly: Badness**, Jonathan was lauded for his starring role in the television adaptation of Christos Tsiolkas' novel, **The Slap** for ABC TV. **The Slap** received five Australian Film Institute Awards including Best Television Drama, won the TV Week Logie Award for Most Outstanding Drama Series, and was nominated for a BAFTA for Best International Program - with Jonathan receiving an AFI nomination for Best Lead Actor in a Drama Series for his performance as Hector.

Internationally, Jonathan has starred opposite Kathryn Morris in CBS' **Cold Case**, **The District** alongside Craig T. Nelson for CBS, in **Windfall** for NBC, **New York Undercover** for Fox and **Seven Days** for UPN - receiving a nomination for a Saturn Award for Best Genre Actor for his role.

His other credits include guest roles in **The Mentalist**, **Camp**, **Law & Order**, **Sopranos**, **Law & Order: Criminal Intent**, **Moonlight**, **NCIS**, **Bones**, **Castle** and **Burn Notice**.

Most recently featuring in a starring role in the independent film **Pioneer**, opposite Wes Bentley and Stephen Lang, Jonathan's other feature credits include Woody Allen's **Deconstructing Harry**, Stephan Kay's **The Dead Will Tell** opposite Anne Heche, William Kaufman's **The Hit List** and John Soto's **The Reckoning -** receiving the Silent River Film Festival 2014 Best Actor Award in Los Angeles, as well as a 2014 Best Actor nomination at the British Independent Film Festival Awards for his performance.

Jim

As a result of Dr McNaughton's lies, Jim is facing manslaughter charges for the death of Greg Mathieson, threatening both his future with Joan and his ability to raise his son James.

Matthew Le Nevez is Jim

Having forged a diverse and rewarding career in film and television, it was Matthew Le Nevez's portrayal of *Dr Patrick Reid* opposite Asher Keddie in Network Ten's popular series **Offspring** that garnered him national attention with television audiences and for which he received TV Week Logie nominations for *Most Popular Actor* in 2013 and 2014. Matthew graduated from the National Institute of Dramatic Art (NIDA) in 1999 and made his feature film debut as a drug fuelled rock star in Alex Proyas's **Garage Days**. This followed with roles in Craig Monahan's **Peaches** alongside Jacqueline McKenzie and Hugo Weaving, and Jonathan Ogilvie's **The Tenderhook** opposite Rose Byrne and again with Hugo Weaving.

In 2004, the breakthrough television role of rough and ready Bullet Sheather in the ABC mini-series **Marking Time** resulted in Matthew winning an AFI Award for Best Actor in a Supporting or Guest Role. In 2007, Matthew's portrayal of killer Matthew Wales in Network Ten's telemovie **The Society Murders** won him the Silver TV Week Logie for Most Outstanding Actor. Other television credits for Matthew include appearances in prominent Australian series and telemovies such as Love My Way, Blue Heelers, Postcard Bandit, White Collar Blue, All Saints, MDA, and the multi award winning mini-series Howzat! in which he played legendary Australian cricketer Dennis Lillee. In 2013 Matthew was the recipient of the GQ Television Actor of the Year Award. Matthew was most recently seen in the ABC telemovie **Parer's War** in the leading role of war photographer Damian Parer.

In early 2016 Matt will seen in the highly anticipated Foxtel mystery drama series **The Kettering Incident** alongside Elizabeth Debicki. Matt is currently filming the lead role of legendary Australian racing car driver *Peter Brock* in the telemovie **BROCK** for Network Ten.

The following year she received her second TV Week Logie nomination for Most Outstanding Actress for her portrayal of Nene King in **Paper Giants: Magazine Wars**.

With feature film credits including **Ned Kelly** and **The Bank**, Mandy's numerous other television credits include **A Moody Christmas**, **At Home with Julia**, **Comedy Inc**, **Bed of Roses**, **MDA**, **All Saints**, **The Alice**, **Welcher & Welcher**, **Stingers**, **Kath & Kim**, **Blue Heelers**, and **Water Rats**.

With theatre roles including Cinderella & Forget Me Not (Belvoir Theatre), Dreams of White (Griffin Theatre Co), In the Next Room (or The Vibrator play), The Beauty Queen of Leenane, Kafka's Metamorphosis, The Great and Don's Party (STC); When The Rain Stops Falling (Brink); The Hypocrite, Life After George and Pride & Prejudice (MTC); This Way Up, Holy Day, Twilight Series and Inside 2000 (Playbox).

In 2010 Mandy was nominated for the USA Helen Hayes Award for Outstanding Supporting Performer for A Streetcar Named Desire which she performed in both Washington DC and New York. Previously Mandy was nominated for the 1998 Green Room Award for Best Actress in a Featured Role for The Herbal Bed at the MTC.

Miranda is well known for her performance in the multi-award winning feature film **The Sapphires**, playing one of four lead characters. Miranda captured the hearts of the viewing public with her portrayal of the feisty *Cynthia* with the film receiving many accolades on the international festival circuit and for which Miranda received a Deadly Award Nomination for *Female Actor of the Year*.

Miranda is also renowned for her role in **Love Child**, recently receiving two TV Week Logie Awards - Most Popular New Talent and the Graham Kennedy Award for Most Outstanding Newcomer. Miranda starred in season one of the popular ABC TV series **Redfern Now** and **Black Comedy**. She appeared in the main cast role of *Ida Pender* in Screentime's **Underbelly: Squizzy** in 2013, as *Tammy* on the hugely popular Foxtel series **Slide**, and as *Vicki* in two series of **Lockie Leonard**. More recently, Gracie was seen in the miniseries **Gallipoli** for the Nine Network.

Lincoln Younes is Chris

He first appeared on local television screens in the role of *Roman Kovac* in the Foxtel series **Tangle**, receiving the 2013 ASTRA Best Actor Award for Season 3.

She previously starred as the lead performer in ABC's **Worst Year Of My Life, Again!**, which was nominated for *Most Outstanding Children's Drama* for the 2015 TV Week Logie Awards. Tiarnie's other television credits include **Double Take** and **The Upside Down Show**.

In 2007, she made her film debut in Brian Andrews and Jane Forrest's film **The Final Winter**. Tiarnie's other film credits include **The Half Dead** and **Kiss of the Damned**.

Joan (Jessica Marais) is devastated to discover an infection has left her almost certainly infertile, while delinquent teen Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland) is determined to discover the identity of her birth mother. Matron (Mandy McElhinney) is on a mission to have Stanton House reopened while Bowditch (Andrew Ryan) quits his job, much to Martha's (Miranda Tapsell) disappointment.

Forced to continue living in the hospital whilst juggling work, a baby and a husband in remand, an exhausted Joan (Jessica Marais) collapses and is rushed into surgery. It's a dire result - an infection has left her almost certainly infertile.

Annie (Gracie Gilbert) is finally letting herself enjoy her time with Chris (Lincoln Younes), despite Matron's (Mandy McElhinney) presence in her life proving to always be a thorn in her side.

Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland), an out-of-control teen armed with a letter written by her birth mother, breaks into the abandoned Stanton House demanding answers. Her fed-up adoptive mother discovers Maggie is pregnant so relinquishes her to the State - sending her screaming back to the forbidding Tarramar Girls Home. Viv (Sophie Hensser) is on a quest to find Maggie's biological mother, but it's Shirley (Ella Scott Lynch) who finds Maggie's letter, and recognises her own writing. Maggie is the daughter she had given up fifteen years before.

Meanwhile, Matron (Mandy McElhinney) shoehorns her way onto the hospital board only to have her motion to reopen Stanton House defeated.

Thrilled with his decision to quit medicine, Bowditch (Andrew Ryan) proposes to Martha (Miranda Tapsell), but Martha is not prepared to marry someone who has thrown away their career.

Shirley (Ella Scott Lynch) fights to keep her job at the Blue Moon as Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland) learns the truth of their relationship. Joan (Jessica Marais) uncovers McNaughton's (Jonathan LaPaglia) part in Greg Mathieson's death, and Viv (Sophie Hensser) loses her twins all over again.

Still reeling after discovering Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland) is her daughter, Shirley (Ella Scott Lynch) is dealt another blow when the new owner of the Blue Moon, Leon (Jeremy Lindsay Taylor), gives her an ultimatum – triple the week's takings or lose your job. Determined to succeed, Shirley capitalises on the U.S. soldiers flooding into the Cross, with a 24-hour 'Groove Train' gala. Amidst the preparations, she makes an uncomfortable visit to Tarramar Girls Home to return Maggie's letter - leaving the girl suspicious of her motives.

In a risky move, Viv (Sophie Hensser) befriends her twins' adoptive mother Faye (Jessica Donoghue), but when one of the twins is rushed to hospital, Matron (Mandy McElhinney) connects the dots.

Viv is taken to task for making contact with her babies and their adoptive mother, but it's nothing compared to the painful news she later receives - the twins are moving overseas permanently.

Meanwhile, Joan (Jessica Marais) is furious with McNaughton (Jonathan LaPaglia) when she discovers he witnessed Greg Mathieson's death (at the end of Season 2) and did nothing to save him. Joan suspects the sudden appearance of a pro bono lawyer who gets Jim (Matthew Le Nevez) out on bail is McNaughton's way of assuaging his guilt.

Chris (Lincoln Younes) wants to prove himself to Annie (Gracie Gilbert), but a lowly job at the hospital isn't appealing. He bolts, leaving behind a wad of cash and no word on when he'll be back.

A severe bout of morning sickness makes Annie too ill to perform, and she unexpectedly bails on the 'Groove Train' gig. Shirley heads to the Oasis to look for Annie but instead finds Maggie, who has escaped from Tarramar to confront Shirley about being her mother. Shirley admits the truth but says she can't be the mother Maggie needs. The situation intensifies when Maggie discovers Shirley had another child, Ben, and kept him. Irate and betrayed, Maggie runs, leaving Shirley shaken.

Whilst being blackmailed by McNaughton's (Jonathan LaPaglia) estranged wife, Joan (Jessica Marais) rescues Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland) and other abused girls from Tarramar by agreeing to help Matron (Mandy McElhinney) reopen Stanton House.

Eva (Maya Stange) surprises her estranged husband McNaughton (Jonathan LaPaglia) with an ultimatum; she wants his help with a new fertility treatment so she can have another child, or else she will publicly name Joan (Jessica Marais) in their divorce proceedings. McNaughton is unmoving, refusing to administer experimental drugs. McNaughton informs Joan of Eva's plan, forcing Joan to admit to Jim (Matthew Le Nevez) that she once had an affair with McNaughton.

More pressing problems arise when Joan discovers that Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland) (and other young girls) are being sexually abused at Tarramar Girls Home. Desperate to get the girls to safety, Joan makes an unsavoury deal with Matron (Mandy McElhinney) - only by reopening Stanton House will Maggie and the other pregnant girls have somewhere safe to go.

As Matron convinces Norman (Richard Healy) to release the girls, Joan must persuade the retiring (and recalcitrant) Chairman of the Hospital Board to give Stanton House his blessing. At his retirement party, Joan puts on a charm offensive that succeeds – Stanton House will reopen.

Meanwhile, in defending Martha (Miranda Tapsell) against a racist slight, Bowditch (Andrew Ryan) gallantly pushes the inebriated Chairman into the pool, convincing Martha to propose to him in the process.

When Joan and Matron turn up to collect the girls from Tarramar, Norman has hidden Maggie. With Cynthia's (Lauren Esposito) help they find her, and not before time – as in desperation, Maggie has swallowed bleach and is convulsing on the dormitory floor.

As Maggie recovers in hospital, Joan is unexpectedly approached by Eva directly. Eva suggests she will not make good her threat if Joan administers the fertility drugs she wants.

As Joan (Jessica Marias) struggles to admit her infertility to Jim (Matthew Le Nevez), Annie (Gracie Gilbert) faces the death of her father (David Whitney), but not before he encourages her to go to Vietnam as an entertainer.

Annie (Gracie Gilbert) is filled with excitement about her chance to sing for the troops in Vietnam but a surprise visit from her mother, Eleanor (Helen Thomson), brings bad news; her father is on his deathbed and he wants to see her one last time.

Back in Newcastle, Annie introduces her family to Deanna, the baby they'd thought she'd given up. Tension mounts when Chris (Lincoln Younes) shows up, wanting to marry Annie and confirming Eleanor's suspicions that baby number two is on the way.

Annie's father dies, but not before he urges Annie to go ahead with her trip to Vietnam...

As Joan (Jessica Marais) begins Eva (Maya Stange) on fertility treatment, her relationship with Jim (Matthew Le Nevez) is strained. He wants her career to take a backseat to her family, but Jim himself can't keep a job because of his legal situation.

Meanwhile, Patty (Harriet Dyer) has developed a crush on Jim, impulsively kissing him at the crèche, leaving her riddled with guilt.

After receiving a reel of film from her brother Bernie, who is serving in Vietnam, Viv (Sophie Hensser) is convinced he's in trouble. She decides she'll join Annie in Vietnam as a nurse and locate her brother while she's there.

Matron (Mandy McElhinney) has Stanton House back up and running. Shirley (Ella Scott Lynch) tries to make life easier for Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland), sharing with her a secret hiding place she used when she was there.

Now receiving fertility treatment unbeknownst to McNaughton (Jonathan LaPaglia), Eva turns up on his doorstep with the intention of seducing him.

Meanwhile, struggling to accept the truth, Joan finally confesses to Jim, telling him she can no longer have children.

In Vietnam, Viv (Sophie Hensser) finds herself holding her newly orphaned baby nephew; Joan (Jessica Marais) confirms Eva (Maya Stange) is pregnant while Patty (Harriet Dyer) and Jim (Matthew Le Nevez) give in to their lust.

Although Annie (Gracie Gilbert) is a hit singing for the troops, Chris (Lincoln Younes) is furious with Shirley (Ella Scott Lynch) for arranging Annie's trip to a war zone.

Meanwhile, Viv (Sophie Hensser) is struggling to find her brother. His friend, Harry (Paul Pantano), is sketchy on the details, but admits that Bernie went AWOL days ago. Viv discovers Hoang (Maria Tran), Bernie's Vietnamese wife, and their child, only to have her confirm Bernie is dead. In the midst of a battle, Viv witnesses Hoang step on a land mine with tragic consequences. Viv is left with her now orphaned nephew in her arms, determined not to leave him alone...

Eva's (Maya Stange) fertility treatment has worked and Joan (Jessica Marais) confirms she is pregnant. Eva admits to Joan that McNaughton (Jonathan LaPaglia) is the father but he doesn't yet know... Meanwhile, Joan is convinced her own infertility has affected Jim's (Matthew Le Nevez) love for her.

Patty (Harriet Dyer) tries to take her mind off Jim by throwing herself into wedding preparations for Martha (Miranda Tapsell), but after a scuffle with an aggressive father at the crèche, Patty and Jim can no longer deny their chemistry and fall into each other's arms.

Maggie (Tiarnie Coupland) struggles at Stanton House and is terrified when she sees what it's really like to give birth. But the discovery of Shirley's (Ella Scott Lynch) teenage diary brings her a sense of comfort.

While Viv (Sophie Hensser) is forced to leave her orphaned nephew behind in Vietnam, Joan (Jessica Marais) is devastated when she learns that Jim (Matt Le Nevez) has done a runner to avoid goal... taking baby James with him.

In Vietnam, Annie (Gracie Gilbert) is fed up with helping the war's propaganda machine as Viv (Sophie Hensser) deals with the bureaucracy of adopting her orphaned nephew. When the baby is diagnosed with Tuberculosis, he is denied a visa meaning Viv will need to stay in Vietnam a little longer. This is good news for her brother's friend Harry (Paul Pantano), who has fallen for her.

Annie is left distressed by the realities of a Vietnamese orphanage but further horrors await when the camp is shelled and she and Viv must be evacuated.

Amidst the chaos, Viv is forced to leave her nephew behind. She's utterly distraught as she and Annie are airlifted to safety.

After a scuffle in the crèche, Patty (Harriet Dyer) gives a statement in Jim's (Matthew Le Nevez) defense, but Pete (Ben O'Toole) - Viv's former boyfriend and now Police Sergeant - makes it clear that Jim's behaviour will be used against him in his manslaughter trial meaning he'll face years in prison.

Joan (Jessica Marais) implores McNaughton (Jonathan LaPaglia) to take the stand in Jim's defense but instead McNaughton tries to convince Jim that Joan would be better off without him. A warrant forces Joan to let the police enter their home, but Jim has gone and has taken baby James with him, leaving Joan heartbroken.

As plans for the hospital raffle are underway, Matron (Mandy McElhinney) accidentally breaks the prize television's futuristic 'remote control' and is forced to cough up for it at the charity auction.
